



Snippets from Recent Club Programs

December 5 - Dr. Jack Van Ens, Colonial Theologian Jonathan Edwards

Dr. Van Ens portrayed the American colonial theological leader Jonatan Edwards, who lived from 1703-1758 and spearheaded the Great Awakening of the 1730's and 1740's which led to many of the concepts of human dignity and rights of freedom being contained in the Declaration of Independence. Edwards attended Yale at the age of 12, and gave the valedictorian's speech in Latin a 15. He was a pastor in New York City and Connecticut before returning to Yale as a professor. After his wife's grandfather died, he took over his Presbyterian church. In 1758, Edwards became the third president of the College of New Jersey (Princeton). After only six weeks in this role, he died due



to a smallpox inoculation. Theologically, he preached a Presbyterian concept of a "ladder or existence" that categorized people in terms of their abilities and skills, where individuals were predestined to stay in a particular "rung" of the ladder during their life. His doctrines gave colonists a sense of self-worth that grew into seeking independence from England in the 1770's. His impact on America is thought by many historians to equal Benjamin Franklin's, but they differed greatly in religious belief.

December 12 – Isabel McDevitt, Executive Director, Bridge House

Isabel talked about the programs and services provided to the homeless in our community by her Bridge House (BH) non-profit in Boulder. She graduated from the University of Pennsylvania magna cum lauda with a BA in sociology, and worked for 10 years in New York City with The Doe Fund as the leader of two job-creation ventures that employed over 400 homeless. After moving to Boulder in 2006 and becoming BH Executive Director in 2012, she created and now oversees the Resource Center, Community Table (CT), and Ready to Work (RTW) programs. RTW is a pathway to self-sufficiency that offers up to 29 hours a week of work to homeless to do landscaping for the City of



Boulder or food-service for the CT program. Currently there are 44 former homeless (34 men and 10 women) in RTW who live at the BH community-housing facility at 4747 Table Mesa in south Boulder. BH's per-person yearly cost to support a RTW client is about \$30,000, where if a client did not receive such support, the estimated cost to our community would be \$50,000 per client or more. About 70 percent of RTW clients reach a self-sufficiency level with their work and housing. The CT program prepares meals at BH's restaurant-quality kitchen located at 5345 Arapahoe in Boulder from Monday-Friday which are taken to Boulder churches and other sites to feed homeless. Bridge House generates 46 percent of its annual budget of \$2.4 million. Thanks to Isabel and Bridge House for all they do for to help the homeless!

The same letter will be sent to the City Parks Department asking the City to maintain the field. The City Parks Department maintains several similar fields in Boulder. Sprenkle is responsible for starting Girls' softball in Boulder County from a few teams to over 2,000 girls participating. The Club will look into the cost of making a sign to hang at the softball park. A motion was made and approved to authorize the letter and the sign.

--A roundtable meeting will be held on December 26 and January 2 instead of the regular meeting.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: November minutes were approved. TREASURER'S REPORT: A motion was made to approve the November Treasurer's Report. Passed.

GENERAL BUSINESS: Discussion was held regarding the 2017 golf tourney.
