

## Snippets from Recent Club Programs

### October 1- Bob Mohling, Sights & Sounds of 2018 Oshkosh Airshow

Bob gave a sight & sound presentation with videos of his trip with his two brothers, two sons and grandson to the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) airshow at Oshkosh, WI on July 23-29, 2018. He provided some EAA history highlights to show how the airshow "landed" at Oshkosh. The show uses runways at Wittman Regional Airport and its 1,400 acres of space. Over 600,000 people attended the week-long event spending \$170M in the five-county area. Most of the family time was spent looking at Vintage and Warbird aircraft. They saw two days of aerobatics and flyovers that included 100s of aircraft. Next year's show, Oshkosh 2019, will be held July 22-28, 2019. The show will be looking back on a half century of unforgettable highlights, and celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in Oshkosh. Mark your calendars now!



### October 8 – Eva Doyle, Author of The Reluctant Leader, "Gettin' Along Lessons from the Homeless Shelter"

Eva spoke to us about getting along in the workplace. The most important thing is to show-up (not just be there physically, but mentally, too), and show up with a good attitude. Beware that many of us have a "resting face" that looks like a frown or projects anger. People pick up on poor attitudes – and the attitudes you project. Beware also that quietness can be interpreted as unfriendly. All of us have self "inside voices" than can be self-critical. Turn it off by giving it a name, for example the name of a politician you don't like (don't make it someone you actually have to work with or see often). Persistent anger is a negative and always has source. Practice disconnecting from that source when with others. Anger is a natural emotion and can be a positive motivator. Model good behavior in the workplace: dress, good humor, politeness. Thanks, Eva, for an interesting presentation.

## 10/15/18 - Peggy Leech, Boulder League of Women Voters, Political Gerrymandering – Amendments Y&Z

Peggy Leach, representing the League of Women Voters, spoke about Amendments X and Y, which The League supports. These would set up independent commissions to draw boundaries for congressional and legislative districts. The idea is to avoid the party fighting that inevitably ensues each census, and to have more competitive races. Commissions would be made of 4 Republicans, 4 Democrats and 4 Unaffiliated. These are chosen from a slate of candidates by a process to ensure balanced representation across Colorado. Retired State judges would review the somewhat complex and wide-net selection process. Nonpartisan staffers submit possible maps. They have mapping software and access to historical votes at precinct level to help. They must comply with the federal voting rights act. They try to keep counties and cities together. They accept citizen comments and map proposals. LWV supports Amendment A, removing language that prisoners are slaves, while opposing Amendments 74, 75 and 109. For more info, go to <http://fairmapscolorado.com/>.

The minutes of the September 2018 meeting were unanimously approved.

**Treasurer's report** – Joe Girard gave a two-month update report for August-September because he was not here during the last meeting. We have over \$4,662.00 in surplus funds.

**Appreciation** - President Dave thanked Paul, Joe and Mark for serving in the leadership during the 2017-2018. Joe thanked Dave for being president-elect. Dave also thanked those who served on the board.

There was no old business to discuss.

**Social events (including spouses)** – Joe has invited us to his home for a social get together with our spouses at his home. The club will provide the meat and ice cream. The members will bring side dishes. This will be on Friday, November 2nd at 5:30 pm

**2nd Alert Dog Program** – Jerry Gilland gave very brief report that there is a problem with the new people we hoped could take over this project. So, we still need someone to help in this way.

**Key Club** – Support to P2P, Monarch, Centaurus – Bob is doing P2P and Bill is filling in. Steve is handling Monarch.

**Membership** - Increase membership by 8 add 2 females ` We have 17 members now. We have a female who is willing to join if another one joins.

**New fund raiser** – Golf tournament has been held up by Bob and Jerry, but this is work intensive and we have not seen enough help to do it. So, we are looking to begin a new annual fundraiser.

**Personnel Needs:**

- Membership drive – Assist Mohling
- Webmaster assistant – Steve has been the webmaster; could use a new person in this area.
- Habitat Project Leader – Steve is so busy. It would be a good to have a member to head this up instead of putting this all Steve. Paul said that CKI could probably provide up to 40 young people to help. Steve suggested that we could serve lunch for the ones who are working to help with a building project. Dave said perhaps Thrivent might be able to collaborate with us in this.
- Stars of Tomorrow assistant – Paul has been heading this up. Paul would like to have an assistant that he can train to take his place.

**2018 -2018 General Account Budget** – Dave Rogers did the presentation. He pointed out a modest increase income goal from \$8,636 to \$10,000. Our current account is \$4,662. Dave suggested that we might have to increase our dues later in the year due to the dwindling surplus. If everyone orders the lesser expensive meals, we can stay within the budget. Board members were encouraged to put in a donation to cover their cost of their meal. The coffee cost is \$2.00. The gratuity is 18%, and there is a Louisville service tax on top of that. So, to balance the budget, we need to increase the dues. In any case, the budget that was proposed (without an increase in dues at this point) was motioned, seconded and the vote was unanimous in approval.

**Board Meeting** – We will go back to separate meeting and it will be on Wednesdays; the first Wednesday of every month. The next Board meeting will be on November 6th.

Paul spoke about recruiting volunteers from the Time Bank Boulder organization. It is like an exchange system where one group exchanges volunteerism or services for another's. He provided a handout for the board members. Please see the attachment. Paul is taking 35 young people to Sierra Nevada next week to see the Dream Chaser. Paul did not ask that we pass this proposal at this time but look at it and consider it for adoption next month.

## 10/4/18 – Foothills Foundation Minutes

The minutes of the September 2018 meeting were unanimously approved.

**Foundation Treasurer's report** – Joe reported for August and September. We sent out two scholarships worth \$3,500 and \$1,000 to NYAKA. We are getting good return on the money that we have invested. The year-end numbers all positive. Mark will send out a copy with the minutes. Long-term investments for the dog project have done well. We have enough extra funds to add one more dog to help another young person. The service dog account is at \$40,043.64. Jerry did a good job to kick off this program. Alan and Chet are managing the funds well. We need second and third team leaders to be good stewards of these surplus funds. The report was motioned, seconded and unanimously approved.

**Alert Dog Project** – Jerry Gilland reported that several pups died so this was a setback.

**Key Clubs** – P2P is phenomenal. Ninety have paid dues. They meet in the auditorium. They are having bi-weekly meetings. They did Broomfield Days.

**Circle K** – has met one time already with another meeting coming up this week. Paul projects 44 members.

**The Salvation Army** – Mark reported that our club will ring at the King Soopers on 287 and Miramonte beginning on November 23<sup>rd</sup>.

**Old Business** – Adam requested a LOA. He has new job. He hopes it will be temporary. We will consider approval of this next month when we get the details, but there was favor of granting his request when we have the details. Rudi is on LOA for this current quarter.

**2018 Bills** – There was anonymous donation last year that was used for education. So, this was not included in budget. We did give honorariums to a couple of speakers. Young Life was given \$3,000. This is largest support recipient. Dave wants to include this support in the budget. Sweet Dream in a Bag and Pack Away Hunger are two programs that we support financially and as sweat equity contributions to the community. We support the Kiwanis International project and District projects. Dave would like to continue to support these even though we are not sure what the projects will be at this point. Dog Days was the name of our golf project in the past. The budget was motioned, seconded and unanimously approved.

**New Business** – Kiwanis insurance only covers board approved projects. P2P, Monarch and CKI were motioned, seconded and unanimously approved.
