

Sue told our club members that Uganda, a country of 22 million people, has 2.2 million orphans due to AIDS deaths of parents. The Nyaka Orphan Project was founded in 2001; the first school was completed in 2003. Sue provided the following update in this remote rural area; there are: 1) two schools serving 650 students, 2) two libraries, 3) two gravity-fed water systems that serves about 40,000 people, 4) a health clinic, 5) a farm with chickens and gardens, and 5) a Grandmother Program. She explained that grandmothers are the key to this successful orphan program. They have 7,000 students in 91 groups, have



access to microfinance loans, do job training, completed over 150 new homes, and reach a community of 43,000 rural people. A new secondary school was opened this year. It has 50 new students; there are two new dormitories for the students. We are encouraged to sponsor students. A donation of \$250 provides a primary school student with a uniform, meals, medicine, and supplies. March 30 – Greg Harms, "Boulder Homeless Shelter"

Greg Harms spoke to the club about its history, mission and the various programs it provides. The shelter was conceived by the local community in 1983. The mission of the BSH is to provide safe shelter, food, support services and an avenue to self-sufficiency for homeless adults in our community. BHS works with people who are homeless due to alcoholism, drug addictions, mental problems, unemployment issues, unstable housing, or simply down on their luck. Since mental health facilities have been dismantled through the decades, county jails tend to replace them. In Boulder County, there might be 1,000 homeless



every night. The BHS has a maximum of 160 beds available. Each guest is required to turn in weapons and then gets assigned a bed, eats dinner & breakfast, strips their bed in the morning and is required to leave the facility at 8 AM. There is an overflow called BOHO that helps house those who can't be accommodated by the shelter. For families with children under the age of 18, EFAA and OUR Center help provide for their immediate housing. There are 2 domestic violence shelters available in the county. Half of the shelter population stays less than a week. Five programs are available through the BHS: The Winter Program that is open from October-April; the Transition Program, where clean and sober people can live all year; Boulder County

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Cares, where volunteers go out at night and help provide food and clothing to those in need and the Housing First Program that provides permanent housing and intensive case management support for 55 formerly chronically homeless individuals. This program helps them find an avenue to selfsufficiency. Not cycling through the court system saves the county about \$15,000 a year. There are approximately 1,000 volunteers who add invaluable help to the programs. These volunteers, as well as donations, are what make the system work. The shelter relies on private contributions for most of its operating income.
