Snippets from Recent Club Programs


June 1 – Bob Mutaw, Founder/Owner of A&B Cultural Consultants "An Overview of Cultural Resources Management: Identifying and Preserving our Cultural Heritage"

Bob talked about how he and his work Anne work to find and preserve items of historical value in northeastern Colorado, eastern Wyoming, western Nebraska and Kansas. After receiving a PhD in anthropology from CU, Bob has managed cultural resource management staffs for companies such as URS Corporation, managing more than 200 projects while serving as a business development leader and mentor for staff archeologists, anthropologists, ethnologists, historians and architectural historians. This includes doing archeological analysis and excavations at sites where there are arrowheads, grinding tools, and teepee-rings made/used by American Indians; bottles and other artifacts left by left American settlers; homes and other buildings constructed on the plains and in cities; early railroads; and irrigation ditches. To do this work, Bob uses special tools such as a ground radar that detects buried items, "screen boxes" to sort through excavated soil for small items; and Google Earth to look for topographical anomalies that indicate where American Indians and early settlers lived. June 8 – Tom Sweeney, Retired US Marines, "Fighting in the Korean Conflict"

Tom talked about his combat experiences in the Korean War from 1949-1953 as a demolition expert in the U.S. Marine Corps. He explained that due to lack of funding after 1945 for all branches of the military except for the U.S. Air Force, the Army and Marines fighting in Korea were not given good weapons and proper training to allow them to survive in combat situations. This was especially a problem in the winter when temperatures reached -40 F, and both U.S. and Chinese soldiers had to get weapons and winter gear from their dead comrades. Tom's Marine unit initially came ashore at Inchon, and later went into combat at Wansong that is now in North Korea. By chance, Tom met Boston Red Sox baseball Hall of Famer Ted Williams who was a Marine Corps pilot during the Korean War. Next Tom's unit fought with the U.S. 8th Army that was back to Seoul by a major invasion by the Chinese, the longest retreat by any U.S. military unit in our history. He ended up in a U.S. Navy hospital there, where doctors discovered he'd been shot in the stomach (he still has shrapnel today lodged in his kidney). We are truly thankful to Tom and our other veterans for all they have done.

May 16, 2015—Jerry Gilland and Linda McMullen Present Alert Dog Training Seminar to Adult Diabetics

Jerry Gilland and Linda McMullen, along with the “Alert Service Dogs for Kids” project demo dog, Bandit, held a training seminar for about 15 adults on May 16, 2015 at the Egg and I restaurant in Boulder. This class was intended for those who would like to train their own dog or a future dog to alert for a child or an adult in the family that has diabetes. Because ours is a program that primarily is devoted to training dogs to alert for children with diabetes or severe allergies, and we have age and location criteria (as well as a limited supply of available pups), we cannot meet the needs and demands by others that could benefit from the services and protection afforded by a well-trained alert dog. Therefore, this one-day seminar class was held to provide attendees with basic training principles pertaining to alert dog basics and fundamentals. In addition, a couple of our member families and their alert dogs joined us, and there is no question that their presence, testimonials, and demonstrations were the highlight for our attendees. Many of them commented about how significant it was to hear from families that have and are going through the everyday issues of managing diabetes and also exhibiting first-hand knowledge of training an alert dog.

May 30, 2015—Foothills Kiwanis Club and “Alert Service Dogs for Kids” Project have Booth at Youth Safety Aware Fair in Brighton, Colorado

Linda McMullen, Adam Pauluhn, and Jamie Bennett, representing the Foothills Kiwanis Club and “Alert Service Dogs for Kids” project, had a booth at the Youth Safety Aware Fair in Brighton on May 30, 2015. The fair, produced by the Kiwanis Club of Brighton, advocates widespread access to resources and education regarding safety of children to various kinds of outside influences, including predatory behavior. The event also included access to some general safety information, including fire safety, and more. Educational sessions, geared toward both parents and youth, were presented by regional and local experts and an expo complete with resource organizations and activities for children were available.

Dozens of people came by the booth to discuss the specifics of the project and to ask questions about how these dogs benefit those afflicted with diabetes. Many children shared their own stories about a classmate or peer who was dealing with diabetes, but most of all they came by to pet one of our diabetic alert service dogs. As a result, several brochures and applications for membership in the academy to receive an alert dog were distributed, and some beneficial networking for the future of the project was accomplished.
