

Snippets from Recent Club Programs

3/27/23 - Craig Hurst: World Energy Update

Craig has worked in the energy industry in many places in his career, bringing a wealth of knowledge and insight to energy issues. Energy costs driven by short term fluctuations (supply, world events) overlaid onto long term trends, which are driven by inflation. World consumes & creates about 600 Exajoules per year; about 35% is coal; 30% is



oil; 25% gas; 10% renewable. US is largest world energy consumer, per capita. China is largest overall, about 40% more than US. US is world's largest producer of oil (16.7 MMbbl/day) and consumer (18.6 MMbbl/day) of oil. China #2 consumer at 15.4/day. US largest producer of gas, 90 Bcf/day; expected to grow 10% in '23. Russia is # in gas production. We consume 80Bcfd. China produces ~50% of worldwide coal, but is large net importer, consuming 75%. China is #1 CO₂ emitter, leveling off at ~27% of world total; US #2 at ~15%; India #3 at 7%. If EU were a single country it would be #3 at 10%. China and India CO₂ production of CO₂ is exploding; rest of world is net pretty flat. Lots of information here. Thanks Craig for an informative and eye-opening presentation.

Can/should also put them on club business cards, recruitment literature, and on posters at events. Put on Facebook and social media. QR codes can be "personalized" by putting art or logo in the

center.

Norris Lusche, by Bob Mohling

Current International President Bert West and Past Governor Bob Garretson gave a tribute to Noris Lusche at the Spring Rally.

Noris was born in Columbus, NE, and was a successful Denver banker. He was very active in church and service organizations – and Past President of Kiwanis International (1989). The **Noris A. Lusche Fellowship** was established in 1992 to pay tribute to the leadership of Norris, which included serving as RMD Governor (photo of laser-etched

Lusche Award plaque). There are currently over 700 members in the Lusche Fellowship. In 2002 the RMDK Foundation created the district foundation Honor Club Banner Recognition Program. The banner recognizes clubs that excel in supporting the District Foundation. Lusche Fellow funding to the District Foundation



supported the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Institute (KPTI) at Childrens Hospital in Denver. For clubs with over 30 members, one third had to be Lusche Fellows to receive the recognition banner. Our Foothills Kiwanis Club has over 50 Lusche Fellows; see our annual Officer/Director Installation brochure for full list. Noris passed away tragically in 2014 in a fire in their home. He was a good friend of Foothills Kiwanis and loved our active involvement with Key Club.

Kerry Hassler has passed on

Kerry Hassler, long time club member until health issues dragged him away from our club and two time club President, former passed away on April 5. Kerry always took a lot of pride in Kiwanis, and his involvement in helping our club serve. He enjoyed the relationship that emerged as a result.

His son sent us Kerry's obituary.

Kerry Hassler, 76, of Louisville, Colorado, passed away peacefully surrounded by his children on April 5th, 2023, due to complications with Parkinson's disease.

Kerry was born on November 25th, 1946 to Norman and Nelda Hassler in Decatur, Illinois. He grew up in Champaign with his older brother Mike and younger sister Sheila. After Kerry graduated High School, he went on to study at the University of Illinois, earning Bachelor and Masters degrees in Electrical Engineering.

Kerry worked for 31 years in Colorado as a software developer, system engineer, international project manager, and global technical consultant for AT&T Bell Labs, Lucent Labs, and Avaya Labs. Kerry was extremely proud of his work as the primary software designer and developer of "Expert Agent" technology that revolutionized how call centers operate.

Kerry left Avaya Labs in 2007 to work full-time as a global technical consultant for missionaries, churches, and faith-based organizations, focusing on helping them publicize and expand their ministries through Internet-based solutions.

Kerry's passion later in life was traveling the world; visiting and making friends in 18 countries. He volunteered extensively and was a longtime member of Boulder's Pine Street Church and the Foothills Kiwanis Club.

Kerry was a wonderful father and grandfather; survived by his daughter Christie Hassler, son and daughter-in-law David and Tessa Hassler, grandsons Zack and Blake, former wife Mary Hassler, brother Mike Hassler, and sister Sheila Scruggs.
