Snippets from Recent Club Programs

<u>February 15 – Michael Messaros, Aerial Bait Delivery System for Invasive Species Control for US Dept. of Agriculture</u>

Michael Messaros, Chief Engineer and co-owner of Applied Design Corporation (ADC), explained that ADC is an engineering R&D, technology management, and human resource services firm providing expertise in: product development, management consulting, and professional staffing. He spoke to our club about the severe brown tree snake problem that exists on the island of Guam. Guam is the home of a strategic US Navy and Air Force base (5 mi wide by 20 mi long). The snake has eliminated all birds on the island; currently Jack Russell terriers are used to detect them at airport and sea terminals so they



are not introduced into other countries. ADC has designed, developed, and fabricated an aerial prototype bait cartridge system that can be used to dispense tainted bait from helicopters or small general aviation aircraft. The bait cartridges are caught by tree branches. Sensors in the cartridges are used to track movement indicating the snake has taken the bait. Michael - thanks for an interesting program.

February 22 - Bob Bell, Sierra Nevada's Unmanned Dream Chaser Program

Bob Bell, Chief Engineer, at Sierra Nevada Corporation (SNC), spoke to us about the many space-related projects under development or already in use from SNC's Space Systems and Space Exploration business groups. These groups have produced over 4,000 products that have been used in over 420 space missions without a single failure. In January 2016, NASA announced that SNC won a competition to transport cargo to the International Space Station using the Unmanned Dream Chaser out to 2024. The Dream Chaser vehicle uses non-toxic propellants, lands horizontally on existing



runways with gentle landings, is reusable for 10-15 missions, and is expected to be turned around quickly for a new mission. The second flight of Dream Chaser is scheduled for November 2016. For more information, go to www.sncorp.com. Thanks, Bob, for an interesting program!

- 1. Get a fingerprint sheet. The Boulder police department's main location at 1805 33rd St. offers fingerprinting on Tuesdays and Thursdays between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Fingerprinting is also available at the Community Police Center on 16th Street, just south of Pearl Street, Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The cost of this service is \$11 per fingerprint card.

<u>Project in Kohima, Nagaland to Help Special-Needs</u> <u>Kids</u> -- Kerry Hassler, Foothills Kiwanis Club Member

From February 7-16, I visited Kohima, Nagaland (India) to provide technical consulting to "Tabitha Enabling Academy" Christian school that provides education and physical rehabilitation special-needs kids in this northeast English-speaking state of India. I worked with the Naga staff to take photos and make a video for their website I created in 2011 (see -- www.tabitha-enabling-academy.org), as well as taught website development to one of the staff. They showed me some interesting local

sights, such as the military cemetery where over 1000 British soldiers are buried who died in a large battle in 1944 to stop the Japanese from invading northeast India. We also visited a beautiful Naga village called Konoma known for its stone-cutting abilities. Nagaland's population is 90% Christian, and 80% are Baptist. It was a wonderful experience to work with such friendly, good people.
