Snippets from Recent Club Programs

May 21- Tom Alley, Ranked Choice Voting

Tom, our speaker, is an Assistant Physics Professor with 23 years of Air Force service experience is now employed by a local aerospace firm. Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) is a nonpartisan electoral reform that gives voters the freedom to rank candidates in order of choice. He explained that if no candidate has a majority, the candidate with the least number of votes is eliminated and those voters have their ballot count instantly for their next choice. This process continues until a candidate receives a majority of the votes and is declared the winner. RCV ensures that elections are fair, fiscally responsible, and accountable to the people. RCV for military and overseas voters is currently used in Alabama, Louisiana, South Carolina, Mississippi, and Arkansas. Thanks, Tom, for an interesting and educational program!



May 28 – Dave Rogers, Bolder Boulder Starting Line Security Volunteers

The Foothills Kiwanis Club provided 14 Kiwanians plus friends for the Starting Line Security Team at the 40th edition of the Bolder Boulder 10k "Event" on Memorial Day, May 28. 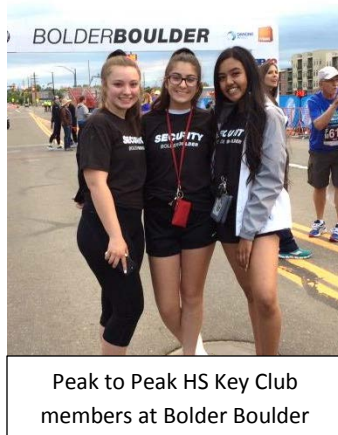

She encouraged us to show perspective members programs that we have planned for the month of June. The Pack Away Hunger event is a Club project that we want to talk about. We need to talk about how

we put \$50,000 into community annually. We need to emphasize how we are #1 bell ringing club for the Salvation Army in the area.

We want to start our presentation to perspective members by asking them if they have heard of Kiwanis Club and/or Key Clubs. Our goal is support more Key Clubs. We are about helping youth. We listen to the perspective member to find out their interest. Companies like Wells Fargo encourage employees to volunteer. Those are good companies to approach. Do not go past 30 minutes in your membership presentation because we do not want to exasperate them. The District is giving \$50-100 to clubs who recruit new members. This money is to pay for new club member dues. Foothills has enough money in reserve to pay the dues for 10 new members so they need not pay if they join. It was suggested that we emphasize that we are new to Louisville. We also have brochures about the Dog Project to handout. Bob reached 6 out of 10 people on his recruitment list. There should always be two at least on a visitation team. We need a team leader between the partners. We should follow-up with our perspective members, especially if they do not show up to the meeting after they said that they would.
