Snippets from Recent Club Programs

January 23 – Eileen Lambert, Colorado Pet Pantry

Eileen Lamb, former reporter of CU Daily and member of Outward Bound, provided status of the Colorado Pet Pantry. The Pet Pantry started 3 ½ years ago to temporarily feed pets, allowing families to increase their ability to care for pets with goal of keeping them out of shelters and with their families. In 2015, her organization distributed over 37,000 lbs. of dry pet food and over 80,000 cans of wet food helping 2,698 families in the Denver/Boulder metro area to feed 5,690 pets. The Colorado Pet Pantry partners with local Food Banks, distributing pet food from each partner location monthly so that entire neighborhoods have access to supplemental food for their pets when they need it the most. They serve six food banks: Denver (4), Boulder (Harvest of Hope and EFAA), and Lafayette (Sister Carmen). Over 80% of the pet food is donated by over 45 stores and individuals. The food is stored in a Denver warehouse until it is needed. Thanks, Eileen, for an innovative program to help families with pets. More information is available at: www.Coloradopetpantry.org.



January 30 – Linda Lee, Wildlands Restoration Volunteers

Linda Lee, Director, of the 501(c) 3 nonprofit Wildlands Restoration Volunteers (WRV) organization, told our members of the need for volunteers to restore our public lands. She described projects, educational opportunities, and partnerships to improve our surrounding public lands. Some of the major projects since its start in 1999 are: alpine rehabilitation, fire and flood restoration, and native seed collection. No experience is necessary to volunteer. She invited us to come have fun, work hard, and celebrate as friendships are born and our community is strengthened. Projects range from 10 to 100+ volunteers and span from half-days to overnights with camping in spectacular mountains, forests, and open spaces. Tasty meals are usually provided. Here is a summary of the group's tangible results: over 34,000 volunteer attendances; 408,734 hours of volunteer work; 241,007 feet of trail revegetated, constructed, or maintained; 221,302 trees, shrubs, and plants planted; 29,429,020 square feet seeded; and 2,565,036 square feet of wetland restored. Our Corps appointments have increasingly involved ministry to people of Central American heritage, with our appointment in Nashville being mainly ministry to the Latino population. Our appointment at Nashville South was to restart an evening worship service for Spanish speaking people. This ministry had ceased to exist six months prior to our arrival; the result was a Corps average of twenty-eight people within one year. By the second year, we peaked at 48. Last Sunday (1/15), with Asians and Arabic people included, we had even 100 in attendance.

Our approach to ministry is humble and loving service towards our Corps people. We care deeply about the holistic health of those who attend our Corps. In regards to Mission and Outreach, we magnify the Name of Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior by sharing His Gospel in the community where we live. We seek to save the lost. Discipleship is important to us.
