Snippets from Recent Club Programs

May 4 – Joe Falconer, Aerial Data Systems, "Current State of UAV (Drone) Technology, Regulations, and Possibilities"

Joe, a former commerial pilot and longtime aviation farn, talked about Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs or small "drones") that are being developed for a variety of business and government purposes. The size of these UAVs range from small helicopter or fixed-wing craft as big as a breadbox weighting less than 5 pounds, to crafts that have a wingspan over 5 feet weighing more than 30 pounds that cost \$400,000. The cameras used on these craft are typically standard products (like Sony) that take photo with density of 24 Mpixels or more, with some using infrared cameras for special purposes such as analyzing farmer crops for nitrogen content. The maximum altitude



for UAV flights is 400 feet as set by FAA regulations, with flight times ranging from 20 minutes to hours depending on the UAV application. The State of Colorado is using drones to monitor areas along major highways where rockslides are possible by putting markers on individual rocks, and using weekly UAV flights to detect when these rocks shift. Companies and individuals who wish to use UAVs for some purpose must get approval from the FAA via meeting their Section 333 regulations, and then file flight-plans for UAV flights similar to any private aircraft. May 11 – Kevin Harner, Rocky Mountain Rescue Group, "Mountain **Rescues in Boulder County"**

Kevin talked about the rescue activities of the all-volunteer Rocky Mountain Rescue Group that was founded to help rescue hikers and climbers in primarily Boulder County in 1947. The 60 members of the group averages 150-160 rescues each year through 14,000 volunteer hours of service, about half of those rescued being hikers. Their rescue teams usually drive to the rescue locations, but at times they use helicopters from "Flight for Life" or from Buckley Air Force base. The most common rescue sites in Boulder County are the Boulder Flatirons, Eldorado Canyon State Park, and Boulder Canyon, where sometimes they also assist with rescues in Rocky Mountain National



Park and in areas near the Continental Divide. The group is contacted to provide assistance from local police 911 operators and the Boulder County Sheriff's Office. The annual budget for the group is about \$60,000 which comes mostly from state/local government funding. For more info, see -- www.rockymountainrescue.org.


budget item. Club member Rich Plumridge plans to attend Attention Homes event in May.
