May 14 – Debra Meyer, Affordable Housing for Seniors and Families

Debra lives in Broomfield and is a graduate from Asbury Theological Seminary's Orlando campus with a Master of Divinity. She has facilitated faith leaders working together to serve the community since moving back to Colorado over six years ago. She works as a realtor along the Front Range and volunteers as convener of the Broomfield Housing Opportunity Coalition. The Coalition was formed early 2015 when faith leaders set out to bring together the city's leaders for the purposes of developing much needed housing attainable to neighbors who were homeless and at-risk of being homeless. Deb's passion to work for diverse housing options and community vitality is rooted in her view of theology as practical. She provided many facts that shows we have a severe housing problem; e.g., the annual income needed to afford a 2-bedroom house in Broomfield County is \$52,200 or 2.7 fulltime jobs at minimum wage, or only 7% of all listed and sold homes in Broomfield County are affordable to families earning under \$75k/year, or only two of Broomfield's largest five industries provide average wages high enough to afford the city's median rent, or 0% of Broomfield's largest industries provide average wages high enough to purchase a home at median cost. Several religious groups are stepping up to provide lower cost housing for young adults, seniors, and lower income families. Thanks, Deb, for this information.

The minutes and agenda were reviewed, motioned and approved by all

Alan gave the Alert Dog Project update – pups are running \$2,000 each. Value of used dogs goes up. If there was a problem with one of our dogs, provider would purchase back. The price can be \$3,000 for resale. We have two dogs available. Alan has applications for a dog. We need to start the process of reviewing applications. June 24th is the tentative date for graduation. Chet Bunting is involved in this. The age for the child applicants is 8-14 years old. These dogs are alerting for diabetes.

Alert Dog Project Treasurer's report by Joe Girard is that funding is doing well. \$3,000 was granted by a foundation. Fundraising for virtual Golf Tournament is at \$2,800. The in-kind donation from a car dealer was 25 oil changes. An in-kind \$1,100 donation was given by Daily Camera. Outreach report is that there are 12 families interested in the dogs.

Foundation Treasurer's report by Joe Girard liquid assets was low last month so he held off on some payments. A \$5,000 bond is due to be received in June. Some investments could be liquidated to pay debts. Bob recommended \$3,000 to be paid in June for Young Life. It is in the budget.

Service - Stars of Tomorrow is done. Checks are being sent to winners and judges. We had 15 enrollees. Some were duplicates. Good representation. Grace Schwab will go to Senior Classical (and representative to district show).

Enrollees paid \$5 to participate.

One judge was paid via Bailey (\$100) and a check is being given to Bob for Leah Mohling

The top three scholarship finalists are Jeff Erickson from Fairview HS, Carolay Strehlow from Justice HS, and Nabhur Lamsal from Peak to Peak HS. They will receive \$1,000 scholarships each.

Finalists for the fourth scholarship are John Fowle from Monarch HS and Adam Kiehl from Peak to Peak HS. They are tied for fourth place. It was moved that we split the fourth scholarship of \$1,000 into two scholarships of \$500. It was seconded. All approved.

A college scholarship of \$1,000 that was returned will be applied to a person from the up and coming robotics competition.

Second quarter 2018 projects included Sweet Dream in a Bag on April 14. It went very well. So many volunteers showed up that the project was completed in two hours rather than the projected three hours. It was amazing. Well-oiled machine in producing the gifts.

Memorial Day Bolder Boulder start line security – our club has 16 volunteers. This will raise \$25 per person who participates. Park east or behind of King Soopers. The time of volunteerism is 5:45 am to 10:00 am. The starting line is 30th Avenue and Walnut.

Youth Programs

Monarch Key Club – Bob had a plaque made for Kate Lunz who serves at Monarch. It was moved and all approved to pay for plaques (\$55 each) for key club volunteer leaders. Peak to Peak Key Club – Bob reported that the election of officers happened last week. They had multiple people vying for Officership positions. The meeting room is totally full with 40 members.

University of Colorado CKI – Bailey reported that the club lacks one signature to get a room for meeting purposes. He is trying to get CKI and CSI delineated.

There was a request for a donation from a home-school group to sponsor a Classical Conversations. Adam will follow up on this.

Bob stated that Pete Sprenkle fields are ready for games on June 12th and June 20th.

We should support Steve Hinson with Habitat for Humanity to volunteer for May 19th at Studio with premier view of Flatirons. It is \$55 per person. It was moved and approved that we purchase six tickets for this meeting from Stars of Tomorrow service funds that was saved.
