

Snippets from Recent Club Programs

May 21, 2012

April 23 - Mark Lopez, Friends First (Promoting Healthy Lifestyles)

Mark spoke to our club about the Friends First organization's "Students Teach About Relationships and Success" (STARS) mentoring program that helps teens in junior high and high school to understand the benefits of –

- Having health relationships and positive communications with family and friends;
- Leaning "refusal skills" and setting boundaries; and
- Avoiding high-risk activities such as having sex and doing drugs.

This program operates through buy-in from school administrators to hold one- or two-day mentoring courses

for "border-line kids", who then in turn serve as mentors to their fellow peers or students in lower grade-levels. Friends First also holds an annual STARS National Conference n Ft. Collins (coordinated by Mark) that attracts students from over 40 states. Schools that havve adopted the STARS program report a marked increase in student grades, attendance, and good behavior. "Quinceanera" is another Friends First program that promotes youth and development and healthy relationship to Hispanic youth from 11-15 and their parents. To help parents to enforce to their kids the teachings of the STARS mentors, Friends First holds parent education seminars. The STARS program is being used in the St. Vrain school system, but not by Boulder Valley schools. The Friends First organization was started n 1993 in Longmont. April 30 - Nia Wassink, Blue Sky Bridge

Nia Wassink spoke to our club about Blue Sky Bridge and its mission in Boulder County. Nia received her Bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and a Master of Non-Profit Management from Regis University in Denver. Blue Sky Bridge is a child advocacy center founded in 1995 that provides forensic services, counseling and other support services to children for whom abuse or neglect is reported. Blue Sky Bridge works with the local DA's office, law enforcement agencies and non-offending family members through investigation and prosecution of suspected child abuse cases. Statistics show that the percentage of children abused before the age of 18 could be



higher than 25% and Blue Sky Bridge has helped over 7,000 Boulder County children and their families since it opened its doors. Nia helps with fund raising, writing grants, and budgeting for the organization. In addition, she oversees the very successful school-based prevention education program.

Bullying: Why Can't We Stop It?

You may know the names from <u>news</u> reports. You may even know their individual stories. Each is different; yet each is the same.

- Carl Joseph Walker-Hoover, 11 years old: April 6, 2009
- Megan Taylor Meier, 13 years old: October 17, 2006
- Phoebe Prince, 15 years old: January 14, 2010
- Tyler Clementi, 18 years old: September 22, 2010

The dates are not birthdays to be celebrated. No, they are in fact the days Carl, Megan, Phoebe and Tyler took their lives. They are days to be mourned—not only by their families and friends so tragically affected but also by their communities and by society at large. The Eliminate Project from Kiwanis Magazine

Kiwanis International and UNICEF have joined forces to save the lives of babies and their mothers by eliminating maternal/neonatal tetanus (MNT), a disease that kills an estimated 60,000 newborns and a significant number of women each year. UNICEF Ambassador and actor Tea Leoni delivered the announcement at the 95th Annual Kiwanis International Convention.

"Kiwanis believes that no baby or mother should have to suffer the devastating effects of MNT," said Kiwanis International President Paul Palazzolo. "Kiwanis will mobilize its nearly 600,000 family members to become tireless advocates for these children and raise needed funds to defeat this deadly disease."



MNT is easily prevented by a series of three vaccinations to women of childbearing age, costing roughly US\$1.80. The Eliminate Project: Kiwanis eliminating maternal/neonatal tetanus will raise US\$110 million over the next five years to fill the funding gap required to provide an estimated 387 million doses of the vaccine.

The Eliminate Project will deliver life saving vaccines to the most vulnerable women and children in the world: those in remote and difficult to reach areas; conflict zones; and with little <u>access</u> to healthcare.
