

### Snippets from Recent Club Programs

#### March 12 - Patti Micklin, "Special Transit"

Patti Micklin, Development Director, spoke to our club about Special Transit – a nonprofit organization that provides mobility options for people with limited mobility. Patti moved to Louisville five years ago with her family from New Orleans after Katrina devastated her native city. She told us that Special Transit is now called Via. Some of the services it provides are: doorto-door transportation, individual & group travel training, driver safety training programs, and it operates "The Climb" bus for the city. The organization provide a record 126,000 trips for 2,247 persons in 2010. She noted that the



mobility service is "service dog friendly." Special transit was founded in 1979 by the county commissioners; it now serves 19 communities in five counties of Colorado. Patti explained that their \$4M budget comes from service contracts, government grants, and donors. Ways for us to help are: spread the word, support Via with funds, and support their fundraisers. # March 19 – Ray Purinton, "Business Relations between China & the U.S."

Ray, who lives in Brighton, spoke to our members about working in China as a Moog employee in the airline industry for five years. Ray is a CU graduate and mentioned that he ran cross-country on the Flatirons golf course. Moog, a fast growing aerospace company started by Bill Moog, increased its revenues from \$450M in 1997 to \$2.3B in 2011. The company got its start from the hydraulic servo value developed by Bill Moog. Ray, in his position as Development Director, represented



Moog to supply flight control components for the Chinese C919 airliner currently under development. Ray explained that there are three ways to do business in China: subcontracts, partnership, and joint ventures. In his position, he had to protect Moog's intellectual property as well as defense technology under the rules of ITAR. Thanks for an interesting presentation!

#### **Interclub at Golden Nuggets Club**

Members of our club attended the Golden Nuggets Club meeting this past week. The title of their speaker's presentation was The Aktion Club: A Service Organization for Adults with Disabilities. Speaker was Carl Shinn, Rocky Mountain District Aktion Club Administrator. There are 6 or 7 clubs in the District that include Scottsbluff, Cheyenne, Grand Junction, Pueblo or Colo Springs. Club members are special-needs young adults. Carl is also the AKTION News Letter editor and their Web Master. The Golden Nuggets are interested in starting a club in Boulder, so there was considerable discussion on what is involved and what is required to get a club started. It was pointed out that in some areas multiple Kiwanis Clubs are co-sponsors. So we may be contacted about our possible interest.

#### Inter-Club at Boulder Kiwanis Club

On Thursday, March 22, Allison DeYoung, Jerry Gilland, Pete Sprenkle, and Gary Symes participated in an interclub with the Boulder Kiwanis Club at the Carillon in Boulder. Their speaker was Vern Mertz, a U.S. Navy veteran who served on a LSM ship in the south Pacific during World War Two. He is also past president of the Estes Park Kiwanis Club. He recounted the days leading up to the invasion of Iwo Jima on February 19, 1945. It was critical we take the island for purposes of a landing strip for our bombers coming back from Japan. It was also critical as a staging area for any major attack on Japan. Japan was ready to defend the island, having built miles of underground tunnels including command centers, hospitals, and gun emplacements. Much of this infrastructure was as much as sixty-five feet deep. Leading up to the attack, we had bombed the island daily for seventy-two days. The morning of the attack, there were eight hundred ships involved in the invasion. It was very difficult bringing marines and equipment ashore due to soft volcanic sand that sank as one walked on the twomile long beach. The focal point was to take the high ground of a dormant volcano 556 feet high. After several days of fighting, a small group of marines got to the top and planted a small U.S. flag. Vern witnessed this. It was later replaced with a larger flag, and a picture was taken. This is the image used for the Iwo Jima Memorial

in Washington, D.C. The battle continued for thirty-six days before the island was secure. Of 22,000 Japanese on the island, we took 1,000 prisoners. The rest were either killed in battle or committed suicide. United States forces lost approximately 7,000 dead with many more casualties. We had 94,000 men in the conflict. Vern explained how his supply ship made forty-five landings over the course of the battle. The LSM was 200 feet long and 35 feet wide with a draft of 3 ½ feet.
