




# Snippets from Recent Club Programs

# <u>August 10 – Dawn White, RMD Division 11 Lt. Governor, "Farewell to</u> Foothills Kiwanis"

Dawn spoke to our club members for the last time as the Rocky Mountain District/Division 11 Lt. Governor before her term ends on September 30. (Note: Dawn's role will be filled by Amanda Griffin on October 1.) Dawn provided feedback form the August 6-9 RMD Annual Convetion held at the Radisson Hotel in Aurora, including:

- Sadly, 53 RMD Kiwanis members passed away this past year, which reminds us that we need to work harder than ever to recruit new Kiwanis Club members. Our Division 11 Kiwanis membership decreased by six this past year.
- Our 2015-2016 RMD Governor is Jon Mangion, and our RMD Governor-Elect for 2016-2017 is Kathy Lee.
- Bert West is a candidate from our District to serve as a Kiwanis International Trustee and will be a candidate for this role at the next KI Convention.
- There was a wonderful tribute to deceased Kiwanis legend Noris Lusche during the Interclub Luncheon on Saturday.
- Dawn is hopeful that a District Committee will be created to make sure the District-level Stars of Tomorrow competition will be held during spring 2016.
- Our RMD Foundation project is to support the Ronald McDonald Houses in Denver and Aurora that provides temporary accommodations for kids undergoing treatment at the Denver Children's Hospital and other medical facilities. Volunteers are needed to help maintain these homes, Tiffany Lawrence is our main contact.

Dawn will be helping with the RMD Key Leader activities for weekend retreats in the fall at the Windy Peaks and Roundup River Ranch sites. She suggested our club consider providing support for the Peak to Peak Key Club.

# August 17 – Nicole Salter, Vice President of Development, "A Precious Child" Non-Profit Helping In-Need Kids

Nicole spoke to our club members about the "A Precious Child" (APC) non-profit that provides help in many ways to needy kids and adults in six counties in the Boulder/ Denver area. APC was founded in 2008 by Boulder resident Caroma Martin in her garage, and has grown rapidly since then. With over 250 service and assistance agency partners, in 2014 APC helped over 6000 youth ... ... and 31,000 adults through their staff of 16 and annual budget of \$1.7 million budget (half coming from city/county budgets and grants). The eight major APC programs are –

- Precious Essentials Provides clothing and other basic essentials in a dignified manner to increase self-esteem for impoverished children and their families. In 2014, \$3.4 million of in-kind gifts were distributed. The distribution center is near Rt. 36 and 287 in Broomfield.
- Precious Boutique Is a satellite resource centers that are located in schools and shelters and dedicated to providing basic essentials for children in need.
- Basics 4 Babies Has satellite resource centers located in schools and shelters and dedicated to providing basic essentials for children in need.
- Give Sports --- Provides new and gently-used sports equipment as well as participation fee scholarships so all children have the opportunity to participate in sports.
- Fill a BackPack Provides needy kids with backpacks filled with school supplies, with a 2015 goal of distributing 7,750 backpacks.
- A Precious Gift -- Provides gifts to children who otherwise would not receive any during monumental times in their life such as birthdays and the holiday seasons.
- The Learning Center -- Ensures that every child who comes to the Resource Center is provided with a safe space that encourages STEM-based learning and complements their academic studies.
- Truancy Intervention -- provides incentive awards to students who have improved attendance in school as an early intervention initiative and a way to combat truancy. This program helps youth in Arapahoe, Boulder, and Broomfield counties.
