

## Snippets from Recent Club Programs

### November 3 – Kevin Mullin, Executive Director of Development, Inner City Health Center

Kevin talked about the non-profit faith-based Inner City Health Center (located at 39<sup>th</sup> and York in Denver) that provides medical and dental services to mostly low-income families and individuals who can't afford health insurance from profit-based U.S. insurance companies. This clinic was started in 1983 by counselor Jan Williams and Dr. Bob Williams to help needy people in the Denver area.

Initially, the clinic served about 2000 patients per year, and now averages 20,000 patients per year. Services provided include – prenatal care, pediatrics up to age 18, adult care, preventative care, specialized services, dental care, and counseling. They also work with churches and non-profit community-service organizations (such as the Salvation Army) to do on-site health screenings and resenations about living healthy. Based on the financial resources of incoming patients, patients pay 35 percent, 65 percent, or 100 percent of the cost, where 97 percent of patients fall in the 35 percent category. Kevin noted that the “Colorado Cares” Affordable Care Act (ACA) agency has increased the number of low- and middle-income families in Colorado who now have health insurance, but our state does not have enough doctors and nurses to provide medical care. About 75 percent of the Inner Health Center patients come from Denver County, and another 23 percent from Denver-area suburbs. The only way the clinic can stay open is due to its volunteer doctors, nurses, and dentists. ### November 10 – Kathleen Alexander, Update on Emerald Ash Borer

Kathleen gave club members an update about the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) infections of ash trees in Boulder first detected in November, 2013. The areas currently being monitored are near the Aurora 7 Elementary School and near the CU campus. The most common signs of the EAB infection are small leaves in the tree's crown, vertical splits in the bark, and D-shaped exit holes made in the bark of infected ash trees. Kathleen said the best option for treatment is to use a tree care company that uses the “Tree-age” herbicide that does not kill honey bees. Boulder has introduced the use of wasps from China that stop the spread of EAB by killing eggs of EAB insects. EAB has not been spread to cities around Boulder, but this could happen soon. Gilland offered to help with alert dog information during the contact meetings. Mohling will set up the plan.

--Board approved Round Table during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday season for Monday, December 29. Walnut Restaurant at 95th and Arapahoe will be used for the Roundtable breakfast.

--President Pauluhn will send letter to former Treasurer of the Boulder Kiwanis Club to provide our board a status and accounting of the grill and trailer owned by the Boulder Club.

The Board of the Foothills Kiwanis Foundation met at the Egg and I Restaurant on November 6, 2014. President Pauluhn called the meeting to order at 7:30. Attending were: President Pauluhn, Treasurer Gilland, Mohling, Rogers, Schweitzer, and Sprenkle.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: A motion was made and seconded the October minutes be approved. Report approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Gilland reported that he found and corrected an entry error in the previous monthly report. He reported that a mini-cost center has been created with more detail for the Alert Dog Program; top level revenue and expenses will still be shown on the Foundation Treasurer's Report. Gilland requested that procedures and monthly reports be checked prior to each board meeting. Sprenkle agreed to provide this "2nd eyes" review. A motion was made and seconded to approve the October Foundation Treasurer's report. Passed.

NEW BUSINESS: The board approved the revised budget for the 2014-15 administrative year. Several changes were made

within the budget; the budget total remained unchanged at \$40,900.

--Board approved \$250 (plus wire transfer charges) for the Kiev Kiwanis Club. Funds will be taken from the Speaker Recognition budget account. The check will be given to Hassler to get the funds to the Kiev Club.

--It was reported that Person will be giving a presentation of his WW II and Korea experiences at 8:00 am on Wednesday, November 12, at Dairy Center. Club members will be reminded to attend to support our club member. The presentation will be given in conjunction with the Veteran's Speak Program from November 7-21 at the Dairy Center. President Pauluhn will bring volunteer opportunities for our club members at the November 10 club meeting.

--Gilland provided the board with an overview and update of the Alert Dog Program. A new trainer is needed; Pauluhn will provide former rescue team names for consideration. The Twisted Pine fundraiser event made \$1800; however, the event was poorly attended by our members. Two pups are coming to the program; the first is scheduled to arrive in December.

There is a service dog need for a 13-year old with diabetes. The board approved a four-week LOA for Gilland for personal reasons; he will continue to keep up with the Treasurer's report and activities while on the LOA.
